CITY OF OCEANSIDE

PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT

PROJECT: MEASURE X NATIVE PATHWAYS FY2025-26

THIS AGREEMENT, dated July 1, 2025, for identification purposes, is made and entered into by and between the CITY OF OCEANSIDE, a municipal corporation, hereinafter designated as "CITY", and NATIVE PATHWAYS, hereinafter designated as "CONSULTANT."

NOW THEREFORE, THE PARTIES MUTUALLY AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

1. **SCOPE OF WORK.** The project is more particularly described as follows:

CONSULTANT will offer a wide array of hands-on activities dedicated to supporting Indigenous arts and cultural practices to Oceanside youth, focusing on the five target neighborhoods, from July1, 2025 through June 30, 2026;

CONSULTANT will include education around Native American history, language, and Indigenous Science (Traditional Ecological Knowledge) during each class;

CONSULTANT will work with Oceanside Recreation and Community Centers to determine dates and locations of workshops;

CONSULTANT will submit monthly invoices for authorized grant expenses to the Grant Coordinator with supporting documentation for any expenses claimed by the 15th of the following month;

CONSULTANT will submit a quarterly report to the Grant Coordinator with information about the participants including: number of youth attending; demographics (age, race/ethnicity, income levels, etc.); projects/activities/field trips; surveys/testimonials; partner referrals, and any successes or barriers to program implementation, due no later than the 15th of following month;

CONSULTANT and its participants agree to participate in all Youth Services evaluation requirements and activities;

CONSULTANT will attend monthly OCSP meetings;

CONSULTANT is required to carry a Sexual Misconduct policy under their general liability insurance.

2. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR. CONSULTANT'S relationship to the CITY shall be that of an independent contractor. CONSULTANT shall have no authority, express or implied, to act on behalf of the CITY as an agent, or to bind the CITY to any obligation whatsoever, unless specifically authorized in writing by the CITY. CONSULTANT shall be solely responsible for the performance of its employees, agents, and subcontractors under this Agreement, including the training of each employee regarding the rights and responsibilities of an employer and employee for

any potential discrimination or harassment claim under state or federal law. CONSULTANT shall report to the CITY any and all employees, agents, and consultants performing work in connection with this project, and all shall be subject to the approval of the CITY.

3. WORKERS' COMPENSATION. Pursuant to Labor Code section 1861, the CONSULTANT hereby certifies that the CONSULTANT is aware of the provisions of Section 3700 of the Labor Code which require every employer to be insured against liability for Workers' Compensation or to undertake self-insurance in accordance with the provisions of that Code, and the CONSULTANT will comply with such provisions, and provide certification of such compliance as a part of this Agreement.

4. LIABILITY INSURANCE.

- 4.1. CONSULTANT shall, throughout the duration of this Agreement maintain comprehensive general liability and property damage insurance, or commercial general liability insurance, covering all operations of CONSULTANT, its agents and employees, performed in connection with this Agreement including but not limited to premises and automobile.
- 4.2 CONSULTANT shall maintain liability insurance in the following minimum limits:

<u>Comprehensive General Liability Insurance</u> (bodily injury and property damage)

Commercial General Liability Insurance (bodily injury and property damage)

<u>Automobile Liability Insurance</u> \$ 2,000,000

CONSULTANT is required to carry Sexual Misconduct coverage on their general liability insurance when working with youth under the age of eighteen (18)

^{*}General aggregate per year, or part thereof, with respect to losses or other acts or omissions of CONSULTANT under this Agreement.

- 4.3 If coverage is provided through a Commercial General Liability Insurance policy, a minimum of 50% of each of the aggregate limits shall remain available at all times. If over 50% of any aggregate limit has been paid or reserved, the CITY may require additional coverage to be purchased by the CONSULTANT to restore the required limits. The CONSULTANT shall also notify the CITY promptly of all losses or claims over \$25,000 resulting from work performed under this contract, or any loss or claim against the CONSULTANT resulting from any of the CONSULTANT'S work.
- 4.4 All insurance companies affording coverage to the CONSULTANT for the purposes of this Section shall add the City of Oceanside as "additional insured" under the designated insurance policy for all work performed under this agreement. Insurance coverage provided to the City as additional insured shall be primary insurance and other insurance maintained by the City of Oceanside, its officers, agents, and employees shall be excess only and not contributing with insurance provided pursuant to this Section.
- 4.5 All insurance companies affording coverage to the CONSULTANT pursuant to this agreement shall be insurance organizations admitted by the Insurance Commissioner of the State of California to transact business of insurance in the state or be rated as A-X or higher by A.M. Best.
- 4.6 CONSULTANT shall provide thirty (30) days written notice to the CITY should any policy required by this Agreement be cancelled before the expiration date. For the purposes of this notice requirement, any material change in the policy prior to the expiration shall be considered a cancellation.
- 4.7 CONSULTANT shall provide evidence of compliance with the insurance requirements listed above by providing, at minimum, a Certificate of Insurance and applicable endorsements, in a form satisfactory to the City Attorney, concurrently with the submittal of this Agreement.
- 4.8 CONSULTANT shall provide a substitute Certificate of Insurance no later than thirty (30) days prior to the policy expiration date. Failure by the CONSULTANT to provide such a substitution and extend the policy expiration date shall be considered a default by CONSULTANT and may subject the CONSULTANT to a suspension or termination of work under the Agreement.
- 4.9 Maintenance of insurance by the CONSULTANT as specified in this Agreement shall in no way be interpreted as relieving the CONSULTANT of any responsibility whatsoever and the CONSULTANT may carry, at its own expense, such additional insurance as it deems necessary.

CONSULTANT shall provide evidence of compliance with these insurance requirements by providing a Certificate of Insurance.

5. **CONSULTANT'S INDEMNIFICATION OF CITY.** To the greatest extent allowed by law, CONSULTANT shall indemnify and hold harmless the CITY and its officers, agents and employees against all claims for damages to persons or property arising out of CONSULTANT's work, including the negligent acts, errors or omissions or wrongful acts or conduct of the CONSULTANT, or its employees, agents, subcontractors, or others in connection with the execution of the work covered by this Agreement, except for those claims arising from the willful misconduct, sole negligence or active negligence of the CITY, its officers, agents, or employees. CONSULTANT'S indemnification shall include any and all costs, expenses, attorneys' fees, expert fees and liability assessed against or incurred by the CITY, its officers, agents, or employees in defending against such claims or lawsuits, whether the same proceed to judgment or not. Further, CONSULTANT at its own expense shall, upon written request by the CITY, defend any such suit or action brought against the CITY, its officers, agents, or employees resulting or arising from the conduct, tortious acts or omissions of the CONSULTANT.

CONSULTANT'S indemnification of CITY shall not be limited by any prior or subsequent declaration by the CONSULTANT.

6. <u>COMPENSATION</u>. CONSULTANT'S compensation for all work performed in accordance with this Agreement, shall not exceed the total contract price of Thirty-Thousand Dollars (\$30,000). CONSULTANT agrees to submit all invoices for payment no later than the fifteenth (15th) of the following month.

No work shall be performed by CONSULTANT in excess of the total contract price without prior written approval of the CITY. CONSULTANT shall obtain approval by the CITY prior to performing any work that results in incidental expenses to CITY.

- 7. TIMING REQUIREMENTS. Time is of the essence in the performance of work under this Agreement and the timing requirements shall be strictly adhered to unless otherwise modified in writing. All work shall be completed in every detail to the satisfaction of the CITY by June 30, 2026. All final reports shall be submitted no later than thirty (30) days after end of term or July 30, 2026.
- **8. ENTIRE AGREEMENT.** This Agreement comprises the entire integrated understanding between CITY and CONSULTANT concerning the work to be performed for this project and supersedes all prior negotiations, representations, or agreements.
- 9. <u>INTERPRETATION OF THE AGREEMENT</u>. The interpretation, validity and

enforcement of the Agreement shall be governed by and construed under the laws of the State of California. The Agreement does not limit any other rights or remedies available to CITY.

The CONSULTANT shall be responsible for complying with all local, state, and federal laws whether or not said laws are expressly stated or referred to herein.

Should any provision herein be found or deemed to be invalid, the Agreement shall be construed as not containing such provision, and all other provisions, which are otherwise lawful, shall remain in full force and effect, and to this end the provisions of this Agreement are severable.

10. AGREEMENT MODIFICATION. This Agreement may not be modified orally or in any manner other than by an agreement in writing signed by the parties hereto.

- 11. TERMINATION OF AGREEMENT. Either party may terminate this Agreement by providing thirty (30) days' written notice to the other party. If any portion of the work is terminated or abandoned by the CITY, then the CITY shall pay CONSULTANT for any work completed up to and including the date of termination or abandonment of this Agreement. The CITY shall be required to compensate CONSULTANT only for work performed in accordance with the Agreement up to and including the date of termination.
- 12. <u>SIGNATURES</u>. The individuals executing this Agreement represent and warrant that they have the right, power, legal capacity and authority to enter into and to execute this Agreement on behalf of the respective legal entities of the CONSULTANT and the CITY.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the parties hereto for themselves, their heirs, executors, administrators, successors, and assigns do hereby agree to the full performance of the covenants herein contained and have caused this Professional Services Agreement to be executed by setting hereunto their signatures on the dates set forth below.

After witnessing a severe lack of Native American centered programming available in San Diego's North County, local Payómkawish/Luiseño educators and cultural practitioners Dr. Olivia Chilcote, Marlene Fosselman, and Rachel Fosselman founded Native Pathways to make a critical intervention. Native Pathways was established in 2024 as a nonprofit organization with 501(c)(3) status. As a nascent organization, we continue to build momentum in an effort to grow our program offerings that provide the public with access to Native American and Indigenous artisans, cultural bearers, and educators. The Native Pathways vision is as follows:

Native Pathways is a Native American led nonprofit organization dedicated to supporting Indigenous arts and cultural practices. Through public education and community development projects, Native Pathways uplifts Native American artists, cultural bearers, educators and creative professionals. We create community engaged spaces and programs that empower everyone to build resilient futures through ancestral wisdom.

Since Native Pathways' founding, our team has organized a wide array of programs and activities. Examples include: traditional Native American food processing, Native plant gathering, basketmaking, beadworking, mural painting, jewelry making, and gourd crafting. Native Pathways has also facilitated displays and workshops at various events hosted by entities such as the County of San Diego, The Old Globe in Balboa Park, and the San Pasqual Band of Mission Indians.

Our team's commitment to sharing our vision and uplifting Native American art and culture has earned praise and outside recognition. In March 2025, California Senator Catherine Blakespear honored Native Pathways Co-Founder and Program Outreach Coordinator Marlene Fosselman

with a "Woman Who Inspires" recognition. Co-Founder Dr. Olivia Chilcote was similarly acknowledged with the distinguished "Shero Award" by the UNESCO Center for Peace of California and Baja for her accomplishments and community service. With the support and funding of the Oceanside Youth Services Initiative for 2024-25, Native Pathways is blossoming into one of the premier Native American led nonprofit organizations in San Diego County.

Executive Summary

There are more Native American tribes in San Diego County than any other county in the United States. San Diego County is also home to a large and very active Urban Indigenous population. Despite this significant presence, there remains a glaring absence of public understanding around contemporary Native American peoples, art, and culture. Native Pathways views this gap as a generative space of intervention where we can empower people of all ages and backgrounds to learn from and with Native American artists, educators, and cultural bearers. Building on decades of experience and connection with the Native American community throughout California, Native Pathways creates dynamic spaces for community members to engage with Native American art and culture. We believe that exposure to Native American cultural practices and artistic traditions is not simply about aesthetic appreciation, but rather it is a window into Indigenous worldviews and relationships to the land. Community engagement is the centerpiece of our vision as we work collaboratively to dismantle stereotypical understandings and reorient the public's perception of Native American arts and culture.

Narrative

Native Pathways proposes a series of classes and workshops for middle and high school aged youth in Oceanside that center Native American art and cultural practices. Over the past six (6) months, Native Pathways has held multiple events for youth ages 10-18 throughout Oceanside and particularly at the Joseph Balderrama Park Recreation Center. For the 2025-26 period, we hope to expand our offerings to two (2) classes/workshops per month at various community and recreation centers throughout the City of Oceanside in collaboration with the city's Parks and Recreation Department.

Native Pathways' proposed series of classes and workshops will all be taught by skilled Native American artists and cultural practitioners. In providing hands-on experiences for youth to engage with Native American culture, Native Pathways facilitates a deeper connection to the local Oceanside community and expands youth access to literacy, arts, history, and science through an Indigenous lens. Our Native Pathways instructors ensure that students are educated on the historical and cultural significance of Native American history and art, students are exposed to Native American languages and key terminologies, and engagement with Native plants provides exposure to Indigenous science (also known as Traditional Ecological Knowledge).

Staffing and Partners

The Native Pathways team and its partners bring decades of experience in Native American arts, culture, and education to our community enrichment programs. We are a Native American and woman led nonprofit organization committed to culturally responsive programming. Our core team consists of Dr. Olivia Chilcote, Marlene Fosselman, and Rachel Fosselman.

Dr. Olivia Chilcote is a Co-Founder of Native Pathways. Dr. Chilcote oversees the organization and ensures the integrity of Native Pathways' offerings are based in reciprocal relationships and respect for Indigenous peoples and tribes. She is a tribal citizen of the San Luis Rey Band of Mission Indians and an Associate Professor of American Indian Studies at San Diego State University. She earned her Ph.D. and M.A. in the Department of Ethnic Studies at UC Berkeley and her B.A. in the Department of Ethnic & Women's Studies at Cal Poly Pomona. Dr. Chilcote is the author of Unrecognized in California: Federal Acknowledgment and the San Luis Rey Band of Mission Indians (2024, University of Washington Press) and is the recipient of numerous awards for her commitment to community-based research. She is also on the Council of Leadership for the California Indian Studies and Scholars Association and serves in an advisory role for various entities including the University of California Office of the President and the California Department of Education.

Marlene Fosselman is a Co-Founder and Project Outreach Coordinator for Native Pathways. She is an enrolled citizen and former Tribal Council member of the San Luis Rey Band of Mission Indians. Drawing on her extensive personal connections, Mrs. Fosselman coordinates all programs and workshops for Native Pathways by seeking out skilled Native American artists and cultural practitioners. For her dedication to uplifting Native American art and culture in San Diego County, Mrs. Fosselman was honored as a "Woman Who Inspires" by California Senator Catherine Blakespear in 2025. Beyond her roles at Native Pathways, she is the co-owner of Native Kiicha Frybread and Native Ink Clothing with her husband, Philip "P.J." Fosselman. Mrs. Fosselman is a former employee of the Vista Unified School District where she worked for over a decade, a proud mother of four children, and a grandmother.

Rachel Fosselman is a Co-Founder of Native Pathways. Ms. Fosselman descends from the Guavish and Huscapish clans of the Pechanga Band of Indians. She is a skilled artist who specializes in weaving crafts from basketry to crochet. Ms. Fosselman assists with project implementation and facilitation at all levels.

In addition to our core Native Pathways team, we have an extensive network of collaborators with whom we regularly work. Together, we bring the Native Pathways vision to life. Please visit our website (www.nativepathways.org) to learn more about our current educators and contributors.

Sustainability

As a recently established nonprofit organization, Native Pathways is building capacity towards sustainability. We have been very fortunate to receive funding and support from the City of Oceanside through the Youth Services Initiative which has helped our organization grow. Beyond the Youth Services Initiative, Native Pathways has received donations from individuals and from Blue Shield California. We actively seek out multiple grant opportunities and hope to secure additional funding to sustain our efforts and collaborations.

Evaluation

Native Pathways currently evaluates the impact of our programming through demographic information collection and feedback from our collaborators. We are in the process of creating a survey to be distributed at all classes and workshops to assess our participants' experience. In terms of demographics, we are particularly interested in finding out the race/ethnicity, gender, age, and grade/educational level of our participants. This data enables us to see participation from the Native and non-Native community in support of our vision to provide people of all ages and backgrounds with access to culturally informed enrichment opportunities with Native American educators, artists, and culture bearers. Qualitatively, feedback and comments from our collaborators at the various locations we host our programs has also been an important way to assess our impact from those who are most familiar with their own spaces and community members. Our work-in-progress survey instrument will be another way to evaluate our classes and workshops. We plan for the survey to ask questions that provoke reflection, such as: What was the most interesting part of today's class/workshop for you?; Did this class/workshop change or shift your understanding of Native American art and culture? If so, how?; and, How did this class/workshop connect to your own lived experiences? Analyzing responses to these kinds of open-ended questions enables us to see Native Pathways' impact and provides inspiration for ways to refine our interventions.

Budget

Native Pathways seeks to double the funding we received from the 2024 round of Youth Services grant opportunities. In 2024-25, we received \$30,000. For the 2025-26 period, we propose \$75,000 in funding to support and expand the progress we have made so far. Increasing the amount of funding we receive will enable Native Pathways to provide Oceanside youth with more opportunities to engage in cultural enrichment programs from an Indigenous perspective.
